### TASKY 1-4 (2018) by Speckled Egg Screening Wednesday 4th May

During this project the **Speckled Egg** dancers were working together to find out whether using Trisha Brown's Accumulation (1972) might be a useful framework for rethinking our ideas about dance making.

We experimented with repetition and unison, and how different terrain and weather affects the way we perform the same movements.

We made our own group accumulation, *Tasky 1-4*, based on Brown's original solo.

Each dancer offered their own movements, which we structured using Brown's idea of an accumulation, and we decided to film this in four different locations over the 12-month making period. We filmed the first phase of the piece, 'Face 1', with film maker Jack Lunt in Dangan Woods (Galway), We filmed 'Face 2' in the sea at Silver Strand (Co. Galway), and 'Face 3' at Barna Church (Co. Galway).

We decided on Galway City Centre as the location for the final phase, or 'Face', of the dance. We made the piece, which the dancers named *Tasky 1-4*, over 12 months (2017-2018), one site per season, and film maker Jack Lunt worked with us to edit the footage to make this 20-minute film. The film shows that the piece changed in subtle ways as we performed it over the year, and as the movements settled more deeply into our bodies. As you watch you can see the dancers' unison movements coming apart and then coming back together again as each dancer works to their own pace and ability; an ebb and flow developed over the year.

No doubt *Tasky 1-4* will continue to change in years to come. We've discussed how it might gather new elements. So the dance might be an accumulation in more ways than one...

**Speckled Egg Dance Company** premiered *Tasky 1-4* at the Centre for Drama, Theatre and Performance at NUI Galway on 22nd June 2018.



A documentary about the creation of *Into the Dark Woods*, a debut play written by learning disabled theatre artist Charlene Kelly, a member of Blue Teapots' acting ensemble.

Documentary maker Fionn Rogers follows *Into the Dark Woods* playwright Charlene Kelly, director Petal Pilley, the cast and crew from rehearsals and set build in January 2021 through to what should have been the world premiere in March 2021.

This intimate documentary follows the company's journey on creating Charlene's debutplay; we witness the excitement of her fellow ensemble members at performing in a play written by Charlene and we see first-hand the courage it takes a debut writer to fulfil the daunting task of writing a play that is brought to full production.

We had planned for the world premiere to be in May 2020 and then to transfer to the Abbey Theatre (Ireland's National Theatre), it was then postponed until March 2021 but sadly the global pandemic raged on and we have suspended the premiere until September 2022

### CRUST by DoubleTAKE Supported Arts Studio Screening Friday 6th May

This project involved 50 DoubleTAKE Studio artists, and began with a series of conversations about 'dream jobs'. The Artists looked at the work they currently do and the work that they would really like to do, and explored the barriers to achieving these dreams as well as the effects these barriers have on a person. They then compiled a collection of statements of Dreams and Frustrations through surveys, group and 1 to 1 discussions, artistic responses and photographs.

**CRUST** was a digital arts project led by Digital Artist Rowena Keaveny and coordinated by Artist and Double TAKE Studio Coordinator, Sharon Devlin.

The project also involved the studio's Artist Mentors; Caroline Hyland, Dee Pouch & Aine Kelly, as well as Studio Assistants: Eileen Flynn, Mark Halpin, Teresa Gvozdovic, Cathal Regan, Neltah Chadamoyo and Theresa Reilly, with technical/administration support from Ruth Clancy.

# We're Still Here by DoubleTAKE Supported Arts Studio: Screening Friday 6th May

*We're Still Here* is a multimedia piece comprising a short film and a collection of visual images created by the artists, artist mentors, and studio assistants at DoubleTAKE Supported Arts Studio - part of Tallaght Community Arts.

Created by 70 individual artists - most of whom live with a disability - this piece explores the impacts of covid19 and the subsequent lockdowns. With many of the artists being vulnerable and spending much of the lockdown in isolation, *We're Still Here* takes a look at how the artists have dealt with the loss of their classes and some supports with the temporary closure of the studio, and the reaffirmation of the importance of creative and social engagement for those who are most often overlooked.

Their work ranges from bold statements, poetry, collage, and paintings. It is a beautiful collection of creativity - A visual response, reminding the world that "We're Still Here!"

# Silent Moves by Aiden Barry in collaboration with Ridgepool Training Centre and Scannán Technologies: Screening Saturday 7th May

What happens when you fall in love with the wrong man? The story of a love triangle, *Silent Moves* explores the real challenges faced by people with disabilities in our society: freedom to work, make friends, fall in love, marry, move freely in the world and make their own choices.

Visual artist Aideen Barry collaborated with a group of twenty three artists with disabilities from two Western Care projects based in Ballina – the Ridgepool Training Centre and Scannán Technologies. Working alongside Aideen was renowned Dancer and Choreographer, Emma O'Kane. Shot on location in Ballina, the film carries a strong message about attitudes towards disability while being funny, moving and beautiful to watch. The film was launched last November at Ballina Arts Centre in front of a huge audience, and was shown a number of times during February of this year.

*Silent Moves* was awarded a touring grant by Ignite, designed to support touring of work which was commissioned through Ignite in 2014. *Silent Moves* was commissioned by Mayo County Council as part of Ignite, a partnership between the Arts Council, Arts & Disability Ireland, Cork City Council, Galway City and County Councils, and Mayo County Council.
