

Introduction

Project Arts Centre (Project) occupies a unique and essential place in the support and delivery of the contemporary arts in Ireland. For almost 60 years, the centre has sustained its core purpose to enable artists across all art forms to make and present extraordinary works that inspire and provoke. Project's continued independence, ambition and quality programming has contributed significantly to enhancing Irelands' cultural reputation locally and internationally. It also continues to play a necessary role in identifying and supporting artists at the early stages of their careers and commissioning and generating new work.

Project is largely funded through a grant from The Arts Council/An Chomhairle Ealaíon, supplemented by grants from Dublin City Council, fundraising and income from ticket sales.

As we still felt the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic in early 2022, it was heartening to see a return to full houses and a busy programme both in and out of Project Arts Centre. We were thrilled to host our first annual Open Day, which welcomed a range of audiences, communities, artists, and friends to Project. Several strategic initiatives were progressed in 2022, including the publishing of our new 5-year strategy, WORK (2022-2026), and a strategic communications review

PROGRAMME

Despite the ongoing challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, we reached 52,671 audience members, employed 422 artists & arts workers, an increase from our 2021 figures of 30, 564 audience members and 317 artists and arts workers employed. We widened and deepened our engagement with audiences through the Project Potential Programme, and partnered with a host of artistic, social, and philanthropic partners to deliver our rich programme.

In 2022, Project partnered with artists Emmet Kirwan, Eoin French (who records as Talos) and Claire O'Reilly to produce *Accents*. *Accents* premiered at Dublin Fringe Festival and was revived in November 2022; with further touring of the work planned in 2024. *Accents* was produced by Project Arts Centre, in association with Mermaid Arts Centre and commissioned by Dublin Fringe Festival. 2022 PROJECT POTENTIAL PROGRAMME

Project Potential is the home for artist led Access & Engagement work at Project Arts Centre. In line with our recently launched policy 'Towards Equality, Diversity and Inclusion', we're committed to making the necessary time and space to create inclusivity through action. 2022 was an incredible year, full of fresh ideas, new faces and exciting collaborations, between artists, local communities and schools.

Our **TEDI Commissions** were created in response to our TEDI policy and published in partnership with RTÉ Culture. Commissions were offered to Veronica Dyas (with Louis Haugh), Tobi Omoteso & Catherine Joyce and Róisín Power Hackett, Emilie Conway & Sighile Hennessy.

Short Cuts was a small-scale digital commission and mentorship programme that prioritised early career artists. Selected participants were Adam Mohamed (Spoken word artist), Roibí O Rua (Visual Artist) and Al Bellamy (Theatre/Film Artist).

Highlighting the critical role of creativity, optimism, and imagination in the craft of social and environmental change, **Rhizome Green Arts project** was led by Artivist in Residence Maeve Stone and Artist in the Community Louis Haugh, in partnership with Fatima Groups United, NCAD Field & Trinity College Dublin.

This year we were delighted to have the **Project Arts Centre Schools Residency Programme** led by dancer and choreographer Lucia Kickham and multidisciplinary artist and Project member Osaro Azams, alongside Alessandra Zevedo, Tessy Ehiguese and Niamh O'Beirne.

2022 PROJECT POTENTIAL PROGRAMME

On August 27th we threw open our doors for our first **Annual Open Day, welcoming over 750 people**. Artists included Veronica Dyas, Tobi Omoteso, Philip Connaughton, Monjola, Aby Coulibaly, Adam Mohamed, Róisín Power Hackett, Tobi Balogun, Simone O'Toole, Emilie Conway, Alex Vostokova, Louis Haugh, Catherine Joyce, Michael Collins, Mary Kervick and Jennie Moran, among many others.

We were thrilled to be able to increase our accessible performances fourfold in 2022, through captioning, audio description, touch tours and ISL, as well as a full review of all our access guides and website access info.

This year we were thrilled to curate a weeklong programme in the Cube in collaboration with Run of the Mill, highlighting the extensive work created by inclusive arts organisations around Ireland.

We launched a new publication in collaboration with Junk Ensemble Dance Theatre, documenting a six-month engagement project with older people led by Project Potential, in association with their recent production *Dances like a Bomb*.



2022 PROJECT ARTIST PROGRAMME

Running since 2005, the Project Artists' scheme has supported the work of dozens of artists & companies and employed thousands of artists and arts workers. The scheme has enabled artists and companies to develop, produce and tour cutting edge, contemporary arts work at Project Arts Centre as well as in venues throughout the island of Ireland and across the globe. We are a pioneer in the resourcing of artist's work. Through the Project Artists Initiative, we nurture, mentor, partner, collaborate, network, co-produce and present the work of independent artists, both nationally and internationally.

In 2022 Project supported our Resident & Associate Project Artists to bring a number of performance works to stages across Ireland and on tour around the world.
